As of July 31st, I have visited 11 clubs in our district. I have to say that I am SO excited about the level of enthusiasm I have seen in the clubs so far. I know this is going to be a great year for our district!

We have also added 13 new members to our district this month (as reported on the International website). Great job!! I hope that we can keep up the momentum and continue with these types of numbers the rest of the year.

Unfortunately, we have dropped 17 members for various reasons: Resigned in good standing; Moved; and Non-Payment of Dues. Are we really doing all we can to keep these members, or are we just saying – “see ya”. Have you asked those moving if they would like for you to find them a club that they could transfer to? Have you contacted those dropped due to non-payment more than once and talked to them, or are we just sending an email or leaving a message and dropping them if we don't hear back from them? Are they seriously behind, or just a month or two? Are exit interviews being done so we will know what to work on in our

clubs? I suggest appointing one person in the club to follow-up with members who are behind on their dues. Talk to them, find out what the problem is, and see if that member can be saved. In this economy, it may be difficult for someone to come up with the dues once or twice a year. Offer to break it into monthly payments. These are the types of things we need to be doing to keep our current members.

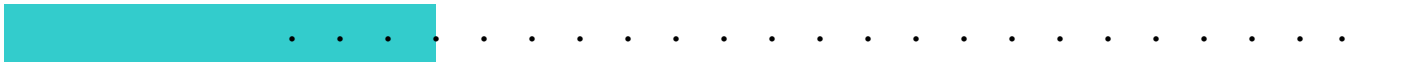
August Service Project

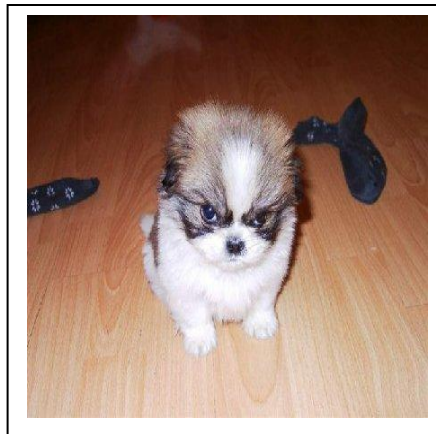
Attend the district, state and international functions if you can. These are opportunities to learn new ideas, meet other Lions, and

Partnership Aims to Prevent Childhood Blindness

A new partnership program with the Bausch + Lomb Early Vision Institute was announced during the International Convention in Sydney, Australia. The partnership program, [The Pediatric Cataract Initiative](#), will seek out and fund innovative, replicable programs to prevent and treat cataract in infants and children while promoting early childhood vision screenings. Bausch + Lomb contributed US\$350,000 in the pilot year to launch the program.

Billboards Promote Work of LCIF

Beginning this summer, advertisements on LCIF's work in blindness prevention among children will be featured on billboards throughout the U.S. In total, 1,000 advertisements will be on billboards scattered around the country. This [billboard campaign](#) follows the success of a similar campaign this past spring by Lions Clubs International for membership.

Lions-Measles Initiative Launched with Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation

LCIF is working with the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation to support efforts of the Measles Initiative for global elimination of measles, a leading cause of childhood blindness. Four African countries have been chosen for pilot Lions-Measles Initiative programs. LCIF and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation are contributing a combined US\$700,000 to this initiative.

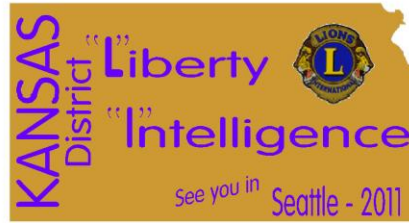

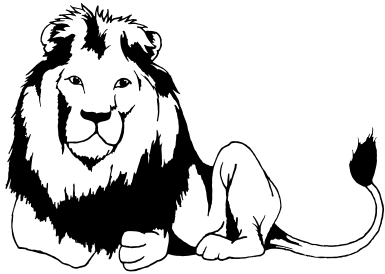
